### Museums and outdoor spaces:

#### Explora

A permanent structure for children from 0 to 11 years, close to Piazza del Popolo that has been created along the lines of international educational museums for children, where little ones can observe, touch and discover by playing and socialising. It offers periodic activities and special events and includes a library, a restaurant, a café and a fully equipped green area.

*Piccoli Exploratori* (Little Explorers) is a small space designed for children between 0 and 3 years of age.

#### Parco Centrale del Lago (Central Lake Park) - Laghetto dell'E.U.R. (EUR district lake)

The small lake is part of the larger **Central Park of the EUR**, and was designed during the fascist period and built in the 60s; it is home to a vast quantity and variety of flora and fauna. The lake houses numerous species of fish. A large, well-equipped, fenced play area where adults are allowed only if accompanied by children!



#### Lunear Park - Garden of wonders

It is the first real Amusement Park in Italy, built in 1953, it became permanent on the occasion of the XVII Olympiad in 1960. After a period of stagnation, today's new-born Lunear Park has been given a complete facelift. Children under 80 cm enter free of charge and two special attractions have been designed specifically for them: *Giò caschetto* and the *Carousel of King Arthur*.

#### Villa Borghese

Dive into the green heart of the city. While there is a dedicated play area for children close to the **Casa del Cinema**, the villa offers large lawns for family picnics and a pond that can be crossed by small boats. The park also houses the sixteenth century **Casina di Raffaello**, including a playroom that offers workshops and experiences for children and teenagers.

#### Bioparco

Rome's Zoo is located inside the grounds of Villa Borghese, and houses more than 1000 animals of over 200 different species. The zoo may be visited on foot or in the small tourist train, and visitors may choose from a wide variety of routes.

### Theatres:

#### Mongiovino degli Accetella theatre

The Teatro degli Accetella has been open for 70 years, promoting shows directed exclusively at children and teenagers, focused on puppet theatre and innovative dramaturgy. Shows for children aged 0 to 5 usually take place on Sundays at 10.30.

#### Teatrino di Pulcinella at the Gianicolo

Traditional outdoor puppet show, near the Janiculum panoramic terrace, weekends only.

### Libraries:

The **Istituzione Sistema delle Biblioteche Centri Culturali di Roma** (Roman Libraries and Cultural Centres System) includes over 40 structures, all of which include a section dedicated to younger readers. **The Biblioteca Centrale Ragazzi** (Central Youth Library) located in Via San Paolo alla Regola 15-18 is specialised in children's and young adult literature in Italian and foreign languages, as well as providing reading room and lending facilities. For several years, the libraries have hosted the *Born to read* initiative: low-volume readings of pieces of children's literature with the support of specialized operators.

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
